Liaising with all the other people who may be coming into school to help support your child's learning e.g. Speech and Language Therapy, Educational Psychology etc Updating the school's ALN Records of Need (a system for ensuring all the ALN needs of pupils in this school are known) and making sure that there are excellent records of your child's progress and needs. To provide specialist support for teachers and support staff in the school so they can help your child (and other pupils with ALN in the school) achieve the best possible progress in school. Conducting additional assessments where appropriate, in order to determine your child's specific areas of strength and difficulty then providing the class teacher with strategies and resources to meet each individual need.
Teaching Assistants (TA)	 He/she is responsible for: Supporting children within the whole-class environment under the guidance of the class teacher. TAs will often work with all the children in the class at one stage or another, not necessarily just those with ALN. Supporting small groups of children, either within the classroom or in a quieter area outside the classroom. In these situations the TA may give targeted support to enable children to achieve the lesson objective, or they may deliver a specific intervention programme tailored to meet the needs of the group.

	• Supporting individual children with complex and/or significant needs. In a very small number of cases a child may benefit from 1:1 support from a teaching assistant, either for short periods of time during the week or on a more continuous basis. In these cases support is highly targeted to meet the child's individual needs and this will be closely monitored and regularly reviewed by the ALNCo. Although we recognise that this type of intervention can be beneficial, there will always be a focus on developing the child's independence as far as possible in order to prevent over-reliance on the child's part.

B. HOW COULD MY CHILD GET HELP IN SCHOOL? :

Children in school will get support that is specific to their individual needs. This may be all provided by the class teacher or may involve:

- Other staff in the school
- Staff who will visit the school from the Local Authority central services such as the Educational Psychology Team or Sensory Service (for students with a hearing or visual need)
- Staff who visit from outside agencies such as the Speech and Language Therapy (SALT) Service or Occupational Health Team.

How will the school let me know if they have any concerns about my child's learning in school?	 When a teacher or a parent has raised concerns about your child's progress, and targeted teaching has not met the child's needs, the teacher must raise this with the ALNCo. The ALNCo also monitors the progress of all children within the school and identifies any children who may be having difficulties. She will discuss these children with the class teacher and may decide to monitor the child's progress more closely for a period of time. If your child is then identified as not making progress the school will set up a meeting to discuss this with you in more detail. The purpose of this is: To listen to any concerns you may have To plan any additional support your child may receive To discuss with you any referrals to outside professionals to support your child's learning
How is extra support allocated to children and how do they move between the different levels?	 The school budget, received from Herefordshire LA, includes money for supporting children with ALN. The Head Teachers decide on the budget for Special Educational Needs in consultation with the school governors, on the basis of needs in the school. The Head Teachers and the ALNCo discuss all the information they have about ALN in the school, including the children getting extra support already the children needing extra support the children who have been identified as not making as much progress as would be expected. And decide what resources/training and support is needed. All resources/training and support are reviewed regularly and changes made as needed.

	• Children who have been identified as having a special educational need or disability will have an IPM which will be reviewed with your involvement, every term and the plan for the next term made.
	 The progress of children with a statement of ALN/ EHC Plan is formally reviewed at an Annual Review with all adults involved with the child's education.
	• The Inclusion Manager will also check that your child is making good progress within any individual work and in any group that they take part in.

 The ALNCo is available to meet with you to discuss your child's progress or any concerns/worries you may have. All information from outside professionals will be discussed with you with the person involved directly, or where this is not possible, in a report. The ALNCo or class teacher will also arrange to meet with you to discuss any new assessments and ideas suggested by outside agencies for your child. IPMs will be reviewed with your involvement each term.

• A home/school contact book may be used to support communication with you, when this has been agreed to be useful for you and your child.
In addition:
If your child is undergoing statutory assessment you will also be supported by the Children's Services ALN Team. They will ensure that you fully understand the process.
 The school is accessible to children with physical disability via ramps. We ensure that equipment used is accessible to all children regardless of their needs. Enrichment activities are extended to all pupils irrelevant of their needs
We recognise that 'moving on' can be difficult for a child with ALN and take steps to ensure that any transition is a smooth as possible.

 We will contact the school ALNCO and ensure he/she knows about any special arrangements or support that need to be made for your child. We will make sure that all records about your child are passed on as soon as possible.
When moving classes in school:
 Information will be passed on to the new class teacher IN ADVANCE and in most cases, a planning meeting will take place with the new teacher. All IPMs will be shared with the new teacher.

 The ALNCo will discuss the specific needs of your child with the ALNCO of their secondary school.
