RSPB Big Schools Birdwatch

In January, the whole school took part in the RSPB Big Schools' Birdwatch. For Class 4's RSPB Big Schools' Birdwatch we did a series of activities; these are a few of them:

We completed a bird watch outside on the school grounds with tally graphs for each bird we saw. We wrote them up on a special app on the iPads and recorded our tallies on a number screen which saved our data onto a pie chart and a column chart. It was a lot of fun and we got to walk around the playground being very quiet and discovering new birds. The most common bird species we saw was the sparrow.

Before completing our bird watch, we made pine cone bird feeders using vegetable fat, oats, raisins, pumpkin seeds, and sunflower seeds. We then hung them up outside around the school grounds.

We played bird games and we had fun also including top trumps with British bird cards. We played snap and bird bingo. We all enjoyed it quite a bit and were really sad when it was time to go. Some people didn't finish their games but the teachers were so kind to let us finish them quickly.

Finally, our last task was a life-cycle wheel, this meant we were choosing a specific bird and drawing its life through four separate stages. We started with the egg, then the baby, then the fledgling, and finally the adult bird itself. We also added facts about the bird writing systematically so that we didn't have bits of knowledge about the eggs dotted hither and thither!

We hope that the children enjoyed these activities and would love to do a day like this again. Thank you for reading!
